

BIOGRAPHIES

Siam Bhayro is Lecturer in Early Jewish Studies at the University of Exeter. His research fields cover Bible, Semitic Languages and the Ancient Near East; early Judaism and Jewish Biblical Exegesis; medicine in the Christian and Islamic Orient; Aramaic incantation texts. His publications include The Shemihazah and Asael Narrative of 1 Enoch 6-11: Introduction, Text, Translation and Commentary with reference to Ancient Near Eastern and Biblical Antecedents, Münster, 2005; with B.M. Outhwaite, "From a Sacred Source": Genizah Studies in Honour of Professor Stefan C. Reif, Leiden: Brill, 2010.

Gideon Bohak is Chair of the Department of Jewish Culture at the University of Tel-Aviv, Israel. He has published widely on various aspects of Greek, Egyptian and Jewish magic and on the Cairo Genizah, including his book *Ancient Jewish Magic: A History*, Cambridge: Cambridge University Press, 2008.

Ildikó Csepregi is Researcher at the Central European University, Budapest. Her research interests include healing rituals in ancient Greece, Byzantium and medieval Europe, especially incubation, Greek, Byzantine and Latin miracle narratives, dreams in literature. Her book on Christian incubation is forthcoming at Cambridge University Press in 2011.

Maria Elena Gorrini is Lecturer in Classical Archaeology at the University of Pavia, Italy. Her chief research interests and publications focus on the topics of heroic cults and sanctuaries in the Greek world, healing cults of Attica, and the Gonzaga collection.

Gábor Klaniczay is Professor at the Department of Medieval Studies at the Central European University, Budapest. His research interests and areas of publications are historical anthropology of medieval and early modern European popular religion (miracle beliefs, healing, magic, witchcraft), medieval dynastic sainthood in Central Europe, the judicial context of miracle and maleficium narratives, canonization trials and witch-trials, visions and apparitions.

Árpád Miklós Nagy is the Head of the Department of Greek and Roman Antiquities of the Museum of Fine Arts in Budapest, and Associate

Professor in the Department of Classical Philology, University of Pécs (Hungary). His main research interests and publications are on magical gems of the Roman imperial period, and Roman iconography.

Vivian Nutton is Emeritus Professor of the history of medicine at University College, London. He has published widely on all aspects of medicine from the Greeks to the 17th century. His recent books include: *Ancient Medicine* (2004), *Pestilential Complexities* (2008), and Girolamo Mercuriale, *De arte gymnastica* (2008). His edition of Galen's *On Problematical Movements* will be published by Cambridge University Press in 2011.

Catherine Rider is Lecturer in History at the University of Exeter. Her research focuses on religious and cultural history of Europe in the late Middle Ages, particularly on the history of magic and the church's attitude to magic and on the history of medicine and the body. She has published *Magic and Impotence in the Middle Ages*, Oxford: Oxford University Press, 2006.

Fernando Salmón is Professor of the history of medicine at the University of Cantabria, in Santander, Spain. He has published on medical scholasticism, medical teaching in the Middle Ages, pain studies, illness-narratives and the patient-healer relationship, as well as on modern hospitals and the works of Arnau de Vilanova.

Shaul Shaked is Professor Emeritus of Comparative Religion at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem. His research interests cover the early Judaeo-Persian language and literature, the Pahlavi Commentary on the Avesta, and Aramaic documents of the Achaemenian period. His magic-related publications include Amulets and Magic Bowls. Aramaic Incantations of Late Antiquity (with J. Naveh), Jerusalem and Leiden,1985; Magic Spells and Formulae.
